Dream Rider:

This 1992 feature film stared James Earl Jones and E.J. Peaker. The story centered on a FUHS student/athlete who was dealing with Post-Concussion Syndrome and the loss of a leg. The true story depicts his healing process, in part, by riding a bicycle solo across the United Stated. The ride begins on the steps of Fullerton's Plummer Auditorium and ends at the Old North Church in Boston. Dream Rider inspired a handicapped orphan boy from Ghana to emulate the theme and the story. Emmanuel Efosu Yeboah rode a bike across Ghana and as he progressed, he developed an enormous following by constantly talking to and inspiring others. Emmanuel's efforts brought about a culture shift in the persecutions and treatment of handicapped persons. Today, handicapped babies are no longer abandoned

to beg and die besides the roads. Emmanuel was later awarded Ghana's highest civilian honor. Documentary film by Oprah: "Emmanuel's Gift".

Dream Rider was the Grand Champion Feature film at the 1992 Houston Worldfest. Later that year, Brown was awarded the Crystal Heart Award from the Heartland Film Festival, which honors and recognizes filmmakers who "Explore the human journey by artistically expressing hope and respect for the positive values of life".

The Hidden Epidemic:

Brown made this film because he wanted to bring awareness to the life-threatening dangers of Post-Concussion Syndrome. Aimed at teachers, coaches and parents, this movie proved to be the ground breaker that has brought welcome change in the way traumatic brain injury is viewed. The Hidden Epidemic continues to be distributed to learning institution throughout North America by the Films Media Group of New York. The movie premiered at Plummer Auditorium in 2008 with a big audience, limo, a red carpet and two searchlights. The dramatization portions of the film utilized FUHS students as cast and crew.

Substantial portions of Dream Rider and The Hidden Epidemic were filmed on the campus of Fullerton High School.

The American Combat Soldier:

Narrated by Efrem Zimbalist, Jr., this 1983 film honored the service and sacrifices of the ordinary American Soldier. Commissioned by the United States Army in celebration of the Army's Anniversary Ball held at the Beverly Hilton.
